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# 200 SCHOOLS FOR 200 YEARS OF THE LEEDS & LIVERPOOL CANAL

Thousands of children who attend a primary school within two miles of the Leeds & Liverpool Canal are being invited to join in the 2016 canal bicentenary celebrations.

The Canal & River Trust, the charity which cares for the Leeds & Liverpool Canal, is hoping 200 schools, close to the route of the UK's longest man-made waterway, will mark the special anniversary by taking part in the Trust's exciting Canal & River Explorers' programme – one school for each year of the canal.

The Trust will be contacting 537 eligible schools and offering the invitation, on a first come first served basis, for children to receive a visit from trained education volunteers.

Volunteers work with the children on curriculum-linked activities such as building their own model canal in an interactive local history workshop, learning how to be safe by water in a water safety assembly and exploring their own local stretch of the Leeds & Liverpool Canal on a guided walk. All these activities are provided free of charge.

The Canal & River Trust Explorers volunteers are hoping to cover the entire 127 mile length from their bases in Burnley, Bingley and Sefton/Liverpool in a programme of visits during 2016, starting after February half term.

Katie Hutchinson, education coordinator with the Canal & River Trust, explained: "This is an exciting initiative to introduce children to the wonderful canal on their doorstep. Many youngsters probably have no idea their local waterway was dug out by hand 200 years ago and played a vital role in the industrial revolution and the place they live today.

"The Leeds & Liverpool Canal helped to create the original northern powerhouse as a transportation route for cotton, coal, wool, limestone, sugar and other commodities. Now 200 years on, the canal is still important as a place for enjoyment and relaxation. It provides an oasis for wildlife and supports a thriving leisure industry.
